Clintons hit the capital to hang out at the Mall





WASHINGTON - A triumphant Bill Clinton bused from the home of his hero Thomas Jefferson to his own new home in the nation's capital yesterday to kick off a five-day celebration of his inauguration as the nation's 42d President.

"Let us build an America where everyone has a place at the table and not a single child is left out," Clinton told a vast crowd at the "Ameri-can Reunion" at the Lincoln Memorial, his first appear-ance in Washington yester-day.

Clinton told tens of thou-sands who gathered in the chilly weather for an hours-long free concert. "We are not enemics, but friends." Clinton, his wife, Hillary, and daughter, Chelsea, and Vice President-elect Al Gore and his wife. Tipper, joined a superstar lineup of top enter-tainers, including Michael Jackson and Aretha Franklin. to sing "We Are the World." The Clintons and the Gores then walked across Memorial Bridge to the gates of Arling-ton National Cemetery, where Clinton rang a replica

where Clinton rang a replica of the Liberty Bell, which triggered a "Bells of Hope" ceremony that included syn-chronized bell-ringing across the country and even among U.S. forces in Somalia.

'Reunion' on the Mall

Yesterday's festivities be-gan early with the "Reunion" on the Mail attended by thou-sands who packed tents offer-ing musical performances, regional American food and crafts.

The all-day event was over-shadowed by renewed U.S attacks on Iraqi military taris that Clinton seems devised to inherit – but the Presi-dent elect gamely kept to his activity-filled schedule – al though characteristically about two hours late. On the Mall, revelers wan-dered through what looked like a Disneyland for Demo-crats: ethnic foods from around the country; music by Little Feat, Michelle a pro-gressive Cajun band – and others: Native American and other ethnic performances, and regional handicrafts.

Vendors sold Clinton-Gore buttons – although most of the denim-decked crowd

seemed to own them already - and T-shirts that pro-claimed "I Was There."
